





Students Financial Aid 2018-2023 (USD)




ALUMNI EMPLOYABILITY RATES 2018-2022





NURSING FRONTLINE HEROES



In the weeks that followed the Aug, 4 Beirut explosion, Many of ARCSON's graduates continued to work in the hospitals where they completed their capstone projects on a volunteer basis, splitting shifts among themselves and supporting senior nurses in every way they could.



Pushed by their ethical and moral drive, ARCSON Alumni volunteered to work in the LAU Medical Center-Rizk Hospital COVID-19 Unit, and the LAU Mobile Clinic delivering PCR tests and training in remote areas of Lebanon, even if it meant temporary separation from their families.



Second and third-year nursing students participated as volunteers in the Emergency Preparedness Simulation that was organized by LAUMC-RH on Saturday, November 4 2023, from 7:00–11:00 a.m. Their performance was highly praised by the hospital administration and the ARCSON faculty members. Participation in drills in critical situations is a vital component of our nursing education to be better prepared as future healthcare professionals.
